

Observe and Conserve


- ◆ All of the small islands in this area are nature reserves. Take care not to disturb sea bird colonies and other fauna. Day visits are allowed but no camping, fires or pets.
- ◆ Please don't collect shells. They are protected by law and provide homes for other sea animals.
- ◆ Further marine conservation details are in the Shark Bay Marine Environment Visitors Guide. A bird list is available upon request at the Homestead.
- ◆ Fish for the future. Follow guidelines set by the Department of Fisheries as these are designed to conserve fish breeding stocks. Fisheries officers visit on a regular basis.
- ◆ Outgoing currents can be powerful and weather conditions can change quickly so always make sure someone knows where you are and when you will be back.



Keeping safe

- ◆ Hot, dry weather dehydrates your body quickly so carry plenty of water and protect yourself from the sun.
- ◆ Coastal cliffs can be undercut and unstable. Stay away from cliff edges.
- ◆ Tropical cyclones occur occasionally from November to May. Visitors are advised to listen for cyclone warnings.
- ◆ Ensure you have adequate fuel supplies.

Your safety is our concern but your responsibility.

Bore water is not fit for human consumption.**

When camping

- ◆ Please camp in designated sites and stay off undisturbed areas.
- ◆ All rubbish must be taken away with you. Please deliver back to the Homestead for disposal. Keep aluminium cans separate for recycling. This helps a local charity. We now also recycle glass.
- ◆ When you have finished filleting your fish on the shore, please dispose of it out to sea, away from the shore.
- ◆ Tamala now has a RV black water dump point on each peninsula. We hope this amenity will be welcomed by visitors as we strive to protect the fragile environment of the Bay. Provision for is made for day visitors to Steep Point to overnight at Tamala's Tent Landing site if they don't carry a portable toilet. **Otherwise it is mandatory for all guests to bring their own chemical toilet.**
- ◆ Pets are welcome. Please do not let them chase stock. Pick up their droppings and put with your rubbish.



When driving

- ◆ Vehicles belong on the main tracks only. Driving in the bush destroys vegetation and animals' homes.
- ◆ Respect our efforts to rehabilitate disused tracks and degraded sites that have been closed.
- ◆ Many tracks on the station are 4WD only. If you reduce your tyre pressure when driving in sandy conditions you are less likely to get bogged and you will limit damage to the tracks and the environment. Refer to your vehicle manufacturer's instructions for relevant tyre pressure.
- ◆ Some tracks are narrow and winding. Drive slowly and be alert for other motorists, wildlife and stock.



Camp fires



- ◆ Collecting of wood is not permitted as it causes degradation of vegetation and removes animals' habitats. A 'no wood fire' policy may be introduced in the future if the current rate of vegetation degradation continues.
- ◆ No chainsaws. Firewood is available from the Homestead - or bring it with you.
- ◆ From Oct 1st to Apr 30th, the Shire of Shark Bay has an open fire ban in place. ***"No fires are permitted during this period. A breach of this rule will result in the immediate eviction of all persons staying at the offending campsite. The maximum penalty under section 32 of the act of the Bush Fires Act for a person who lights a fire under circumstances likely to injure persons or damage property is 20 years imprisonment. The law takes these offenses seriously as so do we."***

On the station

- ◆ Leave all gates as you find them.
- ◆ Don't disturb stock or interfere with watering points or station equipment.
- ◆ Firearms are not allowed.
- ◆ Motor bikes or quad bikes of any kind are not permitted.
- ◆ Jet skis are only permitted at Tea Tree.

This coastal environment is fragile and unique. Please respect it and abide by the guidelines contained in this brochure.

Prices per night, per person

- ◆ Adults: \$17.00 (Prices as at 1st July 2016 - subject to change)
- ◆ Concession: \$12.10
- ◆ Children aged 6-16: \$9.80
- ◆ Children under 6: Free
- ◆ Day visit: \$12.00 per vehicle

When booking online, the fee can be paid via bank transfer, otherwise it must be paid in cash on arrival. A \$50.00 key deposit to gain entrance to campsites is also required.

Come to the Homestead to check in, 43km from the Denham turnoff, on your left is our driveway. Speed limit is 8 km/hr. Stop in front of the second building on your left.

Open Mon-Sat between 9am and 6pm. Closed for arrivals on Sunday.
